JONAH: Introduction/setting/background

QUESTION 1: Fact or fiction?

______ endorsed the authenticity of the man and the story:

Matthew 12:38-41 (ESV)

³⁸ Then some of the scribes and Pharisees answered him, saying, "Teacher, we wish to see a sign from you." ³⁹ But he answered them, "An evil and adulterous generation seeks for a sign, but no sign will be given to it except the sign of the prophet Jonah. ⁴⁰ For just as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of the great fish, so will the Son of Man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth. ⁴¹ The men of Nineveh will rise up at the judgment with this generation and condemn it, for they repented at the preaching of Jonah, and behold, something greater than Jonah is here.

Three ways of discrediting the book have emerged over the years:

- 1) Some see the book as ______.
- 2) Some claim that it is ______, but not ______.

They consider it a parable or an allegory, but not a record of actual ______

(However, Jesus calls Jonah a "prophet" (Luke 11:29) and he is also mentioned as such in 2nd Kings 14:25. If Jonah' experience is not literal, then we can also allegorize the death and resurrection of Jesus, to which the Lord compares the experience of Jonah)

3) Others claim a ______ for the events in the book.

(These explanations do not hold water. No fish has ever been found to be able to do what this one did, nor has any man survived what Jonah survived. Keep in mind; he popped out of that great fish ______, and ready to preach!)

Very often, we want proof in order to try to believe. However, Jesus Himself speaks against such proof seeking (comparing it ironically enough, to Jonah's experience!)

Conclusion: If Jonah's story is fiction, we have every reason to be skeptical of the Gospel itself!

QUESTION 2: What is the PURPOSE of this book?

Jonah 1:1-2 (ESV)

¹ Now the word of the LORD came to Jonah the son of Amittai, saying, ² "Arise, go to Nineveh, that great city, and call out against it, for their evil has come up before me."

God sends Jonah, his prophet, to Nineveh to preach a message of repentance.

Jonah 1:3 (ESV)

³ But Jonah rose to flee to Tarshish from the presence of the LORD. He went down to Joppa and found a ship going to Tarshish. So, he paid the fare and went down into it, to go with them to Tarshish, **away from the presence of the LORD**.

Jonah says NO and runs! But why?

A few possibilities:

Ultimately, we do not know *why*, but we do know *what happened* as a result.

Apparently, Jonah did not realize this truth about God:

Psalm 139:7-12 (ESV)

⁷Where shall I go from your Spirit? Or where shall I flee from your presence?

⁸ If I ascend to heaven, you are there! If I make my bed in Sheol, you are there!

⁹ If I take the wings of the morning and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea,

¹⁰ even there your hand shall lead me, and your right hand shall hold me.

¹¹ If I say, "Surely the darkness shall cover me, and the light about me be night,"

¹² even the darkness is not dark to you; the night is bright as the day, for darkness is as light with you.

While we seem to know *theoretically* that we cannot successfully run from God, **why do so many of us still try it?**
