5 Principles for interpreting Zechariah (from John Piper):

- 1) Realize that Zechariah is aimed primarily at ethnic Israel.
- 2) Understand that there is still a glorious future for ethnic Israel when she repents.
- 3) By faith in Christ, the prophesied Messiah of Zechariah, we "Gentile believers" become full fellowheirs of the promises made to Israel.
- 4) Therefore, the Old Testament prophecies concerning Israel are not less than literal but more than literal: they embrace not only ethnic Israel but also us Gentile believers.
- 5) Realize that many of the benefits promised to the people of Israel are fulfilled in stages.
