"How difficult it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God." (v. 23, 24)

Why?
It's not because carries its own damning was the wealthiest man of his era and he is in God's Kingdom.
It's because – in the case of this rich young man, and so many like him – wealth (and the of wealth) causes so many to be by the stuff of this world to the point where Heaven
We grow to what we chase and what we can hold and what the world values until the perceived worth of slips away.

"With man it is impossible, but not with God. For all things are possible with God." (v. 27)

Peter's response and the value of Christ:
Peter: "See, we have left everything and followed you." (v. 28)

"Truly, I say to you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or lands, for my sake and for the gospel, who will not receive a hundredfold now in this time, houses and brothers and sisters and mothers and children and lands, with persecutions, and in the age to come eternal life. (v. 29-30)
